

DFL, DFL Foundation and Franz Beckenbauer Foundation support 20 non-profit projects through the “Gute Freunde Förderfonds”

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With the “Gute Freunde Förderfonds” (Good Friends Support Fund), the Franz Beckenbauer Foundation and the DFL Foundation are pooling their efforts to make it easier—particularly for young people with disabilities—to access sport and physical activity, thereby enabling greater participation. The fund was established in August this year on the occasion of the first Franz Beckenbauer Supercup and endowed with €100,000 by the DFL Deutsche Fußball Liga. From a total of 114 applications submitted by sports clubs, associations, foundations and other non-profit organisations, 20 projects have now been selected for funding.

Growing need for inclusive sports programmes

The demand for inclusive sports programmes and qualified coaches is high. According to the latest Sports Development Report, the number of coaching licences in disability sport has fallen by almost 15 percent over the past five years. The proportion of sports clubs actively engaged with people with disabilities has also recently declined from 25 to 23 percent.

The 114 project applications received by the Franz Beckenbauer Foundation by mid-October for the “Gute Freunde Förderfonds” further underline this need. In selecting the funded projects, consideration was given to the demand for training and qualification measures for coaches, as well as for specialised sports equipment, mobility support and inclusive offers for people with physical or intellectual disabilities.

Heidrun Beckenbauer, Member of the Board of the Franz Beckenbauer Foundation, said: “The need for low-threshold physical activity opportunities for people with disabilities is high. Our insights into disability sport have clearly shown how diverse forms of sporting participation can emerge once mobility and appropriate aids are ensured. However, many clubs depend on external financial support to create these conditions. It is therefore crucial to work together to remove barriers, strengthen inclusion and, in particular, enable young people with disabilities to access sport. We are delighted for all funded projects and look forward to their implementation with great anticipation.”

Marc Lenz, DFL Managing Director and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the DFL Foundation, added:

“The joint initiative launched on the occasion of the first Franz Beckenbauer Supercup supports people with disabilities in movement and participation—and thus fully reflects the long-standing social commitment of Franz Beckenbauer and the Foundation. We are pleased to support numerous projects and to continue this engagement together: the ‘Gute Freunde Förderfonds’ will remain part of the Franz Beckenbauer Supercup in the future.”

Franziska Fey, Chair of the Board of the DFL Foundation, said: “The large number and diversity of applications submitted to the ‘Gute Freunde Förderfonds’

show that needs-based support for people with disabilities is important—not only in sport, but also with regard to social participation. Our funding aims to provide concrete impetus for greater inclusion and physical activity in everyday life and to strengthen institutions in their commitment.”
